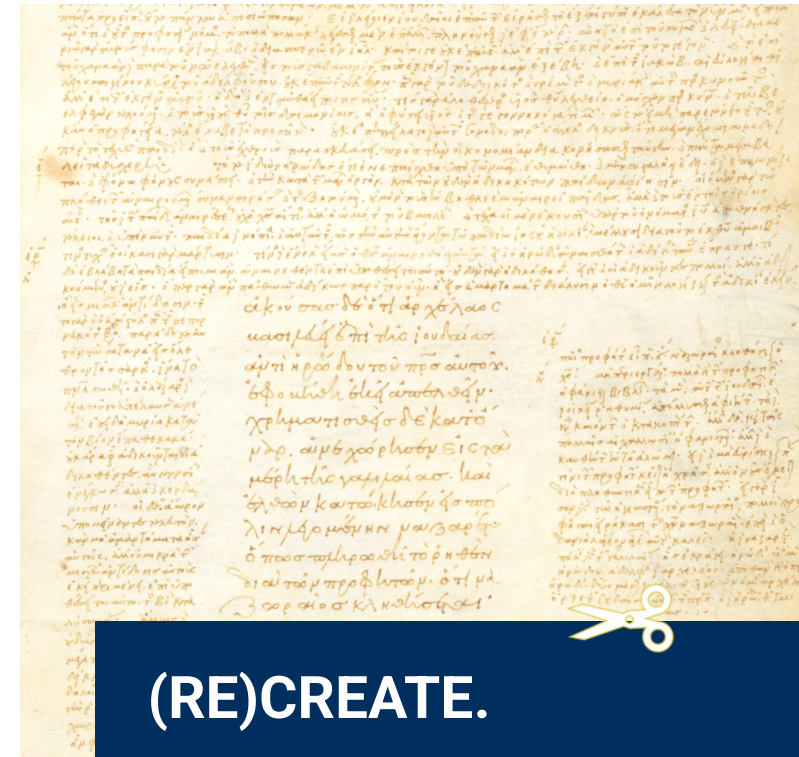
INTRODUCTION
